
TEXAS CHARTER SCHOOLS DELIVER ON THEIR PROMISE

In 1995, a bipartisan group of state lawmakers made a promise to Texas children and families to create a new kind of public school—a charter school—that would improve academic outcomes for all children, regardless of whether they attended a "new" school or a traditional ISD.

Charter students are thriving, and so are more students who stay in their assigned district school. This is great news for students, their families, and our communities.
